We are delighted to be working with Christ the King Primary School, which has a 'Vow to Wow' curriculum; cross-curricular topics are planned using 'Mantle of the Expert,' to promote excitement and pleasure in learning.

DAY ONE: SATURDAY 8TH NOVEMBER

9AM-10AM: PANEL DISCUSSION

WORKING GROUP A: "EXPLORING C-12" - STIG A. ERIKSSON

C-12 is an imaginary place with a history, a future, and contemporary challenges. In this explorative working group, we will draw on strategies inspired by Dorothy Heathcote's legacy, including teacher-in-role, text work and drama conventions. In two practical sessions, participants will explore subject matter related to the conference themes, to question, analyse, and create ideas for working towards a better society around us.

WORKING GROUP B: "TEACHING AS STORYMAKING: CREATING ISLAND WORLDS FOR MEANINGFUL LEARNING" - TIM TAYLOR, RICHARD KIERAN & LISA HINTON

This practical workshop introduces teaching as storymaking through the creation of an island context. Participants will explore how to bring curriculum learning alive in ways that give children genuine voice and agency, making learning meaningful, versatile, and connected to wider

concerns of responsibility and care. The sessions will includes opportunities to look at classroom practice from Woodrow First School, where an island context has been used across the curriculum, with time to examine planning materials and students' work. Teachers will leave with ideas they can adapt and use in their own settings.

WORKING GROUP C: "TEACHING INSPIRED BY A SESSION OF DOROTHY HEATHCOTE'S TEACHING" - BRIAN EDMISTON & IONA TOWLER EVANS

Across two sessions, Brian and Iona will introduce and analyse their teaching using Mantle of the Expert in July 2025 over a day with students in Year 7 at a school in Stourbridge in the West Midlands. The class included students identified as having Education Health and Care needs. We were asked to focus on aspects of the English curriculum with cross curricular links to history, humanities, and PSHE. We were inspired by a Rolling Role project about a boiler explosion in a brewery in the Victorian era, which Iona observed Dorothy Heathcote teaching in 1994, with Year 6 students at a school in Birmingham. In our workshop we will share Heathcote's original materials, and compare them with the materials that we created and used. We will explore aspects of our humanizing teaching, focusing on how we used role conventions to engage initially reserved students, and protect them into inquiry into the implications of emotionally challenging events in a fictionalized story world.

A: "THE CURRICULUM OF LIFE" - CREATIVE AGING & MANTLE OF THE EXPERT - BOB SELDERSLAGHS

Bob introduced Mantle of the Expert as a creative ageing practice during an ongoing artist-in-residency in a residential care home for elderly people in Antwerp (Belgium). During weekly sessions with residents with and without (early stage) dementia, he collectively creates stories and explores imaginary worlds that stimulate the imagination, strengthen social bonds and promote emotional expression. During this session, he will share some of his experiences and reflections on the practice.

B. THE "ECHO OF HUMANITY" PROJECT

- REBECCA PATTERSON, RAJA FARAH, MAGGIE HULSON & HARRY DIXON

At the Dorothy Heathcote Now Conference last year, an invitation was extended to take part in a project aiming at fostering international teacher-to-teacher collaboration between Palestinian and British educators. What quickly emerged was a three-way project which came to be known as The Echo of Humanity. This presentation will depict the progress and obstacles encountered and offer reflections on the particular process we evolved, offering it as a model for discussion.

C. UNMASKING BIAS: PROCESS DRAMA AND THE POLITICS OF PRIVILEGE

- NEEL SENGUPTA, SAUMYA JAKHMOLA, NAVEEN SHARMA, DHWANI VIJ & DEEPMALA TIWARI

This workshop presents work from Shiv Nadar School in India, where Process Drama has been used with Grades 4–8 in classrooms to address caste, religion, Islamophobia, and everyday prejudice. Drama provides a safe yet provocative frame for young learners to step into perspectives beyond their own, surfacing questions of bias often considered "too complex" until later years. By drawing on classroom practice, the session will present how Process Drama can nurture empathy, critical reflection, and early awareness of discrimination in spaces where privilege tends to obscure it.

WORKSHOP A: "PERFECT PARTNERS?" - CECILY O'NEILL

It has been established that marriage is the basis of civilisation, but can we make the right choice?

WORKSHOP B: "FRAMING LIVE DRAMA AS FILM" - THEO BRYER AND REBECCA WILSON

Theo and Rebecca have been exploring crossovers between drama and media production for over fifteen years in different contexts (most recently in Kathmandu). This workshop involves using drama and film to explore a Gothic text. Inspired by Heathcote's interest in the affordances of the still and moving image, we will examine what happens when live drama becomes recorded drama; how representations of bodies, narrative and locations can be shaped through shooting and editing on iPads; and what potential for "critical spectatorship" this process of meaning-making offers. No filming or editing experience necessary!

WORKSHOP C: "DOROTHY HEATHCOTE: GOOD EDUCATION IN AN AGE OF MEASUREMENT?" – JOHN RAINER

In Gert Biesta's seminal 2009 paper, "Good Education in an Age of Measurement," he critiques the trend towards evaluating schools and teachers in terms of their "effectiveness," posing the question, "effective for what, and for whom?", and interrogating assumptions about the purpose of education. From the perspective of 2025, DH's work seems to exist only on the margins of the current UK educational landscape, and her ideas do not seem to impact the mainstream of educational practice - but her work, too, raises questions about the way that educationalists might help forge the future, and the qualities that young people might need to navigate it. How far can her pedagogy be adapted to secondary schools operating in today's "age of measurement"? Can this be done whilst maintaining the integrity and value of her work? In this workshop we will explore these ideas through practice informed by Heathcote, and also in work drawn from the teaching of the late Canadian educator David Booth.

Just like any artist, a drama teacher takes time to realize her true potential. But in this fast-paced world, there is very little room for her to blossom, and the hyper-delivery system is always ready with a penalty scanner. How, then, can she navigate her way through, claim her independent space, and retain the artistic quality and human intelligence in her work?

B. "THEATRE IN MATHS: EXPLORING TENSIONS IN INTERDISCIPLINARY WORK WITH PROCESS DRAMA" - SILIE BIRGITTE FOLKEDAL & METTE BØE LYNGSTAD

Over several years, we have been a part of international Erasmus Plus project: Theatre in mathematic (TIM). One of the main challenges we have encountered is to balance drama and mathematics teaching goals. In this workshop, we will demonstrate excerpts from our process drama "The Outlaws," and together explore how a closer connection to Dorothy Heathcote's teachings could strengthen the dramatic aspects.

The Mantle Network has been awarded a grant by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, to research Dorothy Heathcote's work in history and heritage. The session will incorporate materials from the DH Archive.



ABOUT THE VENUE

Brooks Building, Manchester Metropolitan University M15 6GX

The closest railway station is Manchester Oxford Road, 0.9 miles away. Manchester Piccadilly is 1.5 miles away and Manchester Victoria is 2.5 miles away. Brooks is also 8 miles away from Manchester Airport. Trains run from the airport to Piccadilly Station.



BUSES

Bus From Piccadilly Gardens, a 5 minute walk from Piccadilly Station. The number 86 bus (Bus Stop M) to Chorlton goes to the Birley site. Frequency, every 10 minutes. From September – June, the 141 runs exclusively to the Birley site (for Brooks Building) every 10 minutes during the day. Look out for the big building with the strange exterior – it's the Brooks Building.



TAXIS

Taxis can be pre-booked through Radio Cars, who also have wheelchair accessible taxis. Their contact number is 0161 236 8033. There are taxi ranks outside each railway station and the nearest drop off point at Brooks is on Bonsall Street off Stretford Road. Sat Nav postcode: M15 6GX

CAR PARKING

There is a surface level carpark directly outside the Brooks building with reserved areas for those with access needs. All disabled bays around Brooks are on one level smooth surface on the ground floor.

LIFTS

All lifts are wheelchair accessible and the controls are at a usable height. There are four sets of lifts located in each of the Atrium, which means meeting rooms and spaces on higher floors are easy to reach. There is also audio assistance in each lift.
